STOPPING FOR SAFETY



Every Kaiser Permanente worker, manager and physician—and every patient—has the right to a safe place to give and get care.

Stopping for Safety is a way anyone can stop the work of the team when they notice a major risk—that could cause injury or illness to staff members or patients.





How to call a safety stop:

- 1. First, ask your manager, or a facility or regional safety leader, if your region uses another phrase instead of "Stopping for Safety."
- 2. At your next UBT meeting, ask your co-workers if they know about "Stopping for Safety," or the term used in your region.
- 3. If your region doesn't have its own term, consider using "Safety Stop," which is the call-out used by Workplace Safety in every region. You can also ask the team for other suggestions and come to consensus on the phrase your team will use to signal a safety stop. This phrase then will have the same meaning for everybody on the UBT and will not alarm patients. Share the results with your manager.



ACTIVITY: Whenever a safety stop is called on the UBT, create a UBT project to address the issues that led to the safety stop.
